RD Grants provide short-term funding for the purpose of supporting research in its initial stages, and developing new research questions and approaches. <i>Separate funding envelopes are available for new and established scholars.</i> Research Development Grants are not intended to support ongoing initiatives. They are, therefore, distinct from the longer-term support available under SSHRC's Research Grants. A proposal should address and develop a coherent, delimited research issue, present clearly defined plans for the research, and propose a budget that is fully justified by those plans. Research Development Grants support activities that may lead to the development of longer-term research initiatives. 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TIMELINES FOR IMPLEMENTATION

Funding opportunities under SSHRC's renewed program architecture will be phased in over the next two years, beginning in the summer of 2010.

Summer 2010:

- Presentation of renewed program architecture to SSHRC governing council for formal endorsement.
- Launch of funding opportunities for **Partnership Grants and Partnership Development Grants** (*Insight* and *Connection*) with application deadlines in early 2011.

Fall 2010: - Launch of **Research Development Grants** (*Insight*) for individuals and teams with application deadlines in spring 2011.

Spring 2011:

- Launch of funding opportunities for **Research Grants** (*Insight*) for individual researchers and teams.

Spring 2012:

- Launch of funding opportunities for **Workshops and Conferences and Outreach and Tools** (*Connection*) for individual researchers and teams.

Under the *Talent* umbrella program, scholarships and fellowships currently available to graduate students and postdoctoral researchers will remain the same. However, adjustments to these funding opportunities may be considered in the future, based on additional analysis and consultation with the other federal granting agencies. In addition, it should be noted that certain SSHRC programs—such as SSHRC Institutional Grants, Aid to Small Universities, strategic joint initiatives, and prizes and special fellowships—will be subject to further discussion, consultation and analysis over the coming year, and are therefore not the focus of attention at this time.
