

Motion supporting Child Care

- Motion presented in August 2020 declaring child care essential to economic recovery
- Asked for a commitment from the Provincial Government to fund and make child care accessible
- Asked the Provincial Government to partner with the Federal Government in building a national strategy









The Economy: How bad is it?

Regional context

- Niagara survey of business sector found that 745 respondents reported a combined loss of \$425.1 million
- Arts/Entertainment/Recreation & Accommodation/Food Services industries hit the hardest
- Increased costs due to PPE needs, modified work hours, altered sales/products and lower staffing requirements
- 1/3rd of businesses in Niagara stated they were at risk of closure some permanently




The Economy

Gender Disparity and Economic Impact

Pandemic threatens decades of progress in women's labour force gains. For the first time since the mid-1980s, women's participation in the labour force dropped to 55%


Gender Disparity & Economic Impact

- For every public dollar invested in licensed child care, there is a regional economic output of \$2.27

- Child care output has been determined as one of the highest GDP multipliers and the highest employment multiplier of all major industries



"An expansion of the child care sector as it currently exists would result in a large short-term multiplier" to GDP.





Quebec



- Quebec model has shown that public spending can generated both fiscal and social windfalls:
 - Greater affordability
 - 85% participation of women in the workforce
 - maternal employment grew;
 - birth rates rose;
 - child- and family-poverty rates fell by more than half.



Early Childhood Education

- Publicly licensed model is focused on education as opposed to "child minding"
- Has shown benefits to academic achievement, educational progression and attainment
- Incorporates for labour force standardization (trained in ECE)
- Early identification of development or behavioral issues & subsequent programming/support



Fiscal Policy Toolbox



- Public infrastructure investment
 - Focus is on capital projects like roads, bridges, wastewater systems, highways and other public facilities.
 - Benefit to employment primarily in the construction sector
 - Can improve private sector performance (better roads & transportation networks)


