Session Descriptions

1. Sexual Violence and Human Trafficking

Learn more about the widespread human trafficking issue within Canada, communities uniquely impacted by it and how you as leaders in your community can help to address it through awareness, education and active allyship.

2. HIV, Harm Reduction & Sexual Health

Stigmas surrounding HIV and STD's are prevalent and negatively impact people both on and off university campuses.

In this workshop find out how you can not only practice safe sexual health but also help to address these harmful stigmas as leaders in the Brock community.

3. Team Building Sessions

Interact with other retreat attendees while developing useful communication and problem solving skills through exciting and challenging activities.

4. Decolonizing GSV support for Indigenous People

This workshop will help participants offer decolonial/anti-colonial and culturally safe/appropriate support for Indigenous people experiencing gendered and sexualized violence.

5. Confronting Toxicity in Online Gaming

Gaming culture has a harmful track record of bigotry, stereotypical representation, abuse, and harassment, particularly towards people from marginalized communities. This interactive workshop will highlight concrete strategies for combating harassment and other forms of toxic behavior in online video games. We'll look at ways to address toxicity from the perspectives of players, streamers, and studios, as well as how we might move towards a more inclusive and socially just gaming culture generally.

6. Sexual Violence Prevention and Male Allyship

In this workshop, participants will unpack the impact of sexual violence in their campus community and the importance of male allyship in preventing and eradicating this form of violence. Attendees will be provided with the skills and knowledge to take action in the case that they witness acts of sexualized violence.



7. Turning Toward Difficult Knowledge: Addressing GSV in "uncomfortable" Social Settings

What do you do when you are in a classroom or a meeting and somebody makes a comment that is derogatory and discriminatory--a comment that obviously has created discomfort in the room? Students often share, that even when such comments are attended to, frequently people turn away from discussing the underlying discomfort and the related difficult knowledges. In this session we will discuss ways to speak to such situations--even when you do not feel equipped to answer questions and/or are conflicted about what to do. We will discuss ways to facilitate understanding and make a turn toward difficult knowledge.

8. GSV and International Students

Learn about how gender and sexual violence uniquely affects international students and how you can help to instill safer culturally aware understandings of consent on campus.

9. Kizhaay Anishinaabe Niin (I Am A Kind Man)

Drawing from indigenous knowledge and teachings this workshop discusses the violence indigenous women face and the role of masculinity in ending this issue.

10. Leadership & Identity

Participants will explore the different aspects of their identity and reflect on the impact this has on the way that they move through, experience and understand the world. Through this interactive and reflective workshop, participants will gain an understanding of how leadership is directly linked to inclusion and how to support their wider community.

11. Trauma-Related Responses and the Enneagram Personality Model

The purpose of this workshop is to present trauma-responses from the perspective of the Enneagram personality model. To fulfill on this purpose, workshop participants will engage in an introduction to the Enneagram's nine personality types, contextualize trauma responses and areas/possibilities for growth from the perspective of each of the nine Enneagram types. Participants will engage in self-typing (to a degree) and discussion opportunities through an interactive workshop design.

12. "Calling In the Calling Out Culture"

In this gripping keynote presentation, award winning activist, author and international speaker Loretta Ross critically evaluates present day "calling out" cultures and invites attendees to imagine a different method of doing social justice work by "calling in" instead of "calling out".
