Terrance Cox teaches DART 1F93, Introduction to Drama, and MUSI/PCUL 1F00, Music in Popular Culture. He contributed to the recently published book, Covering Niagara: Studies in Local Popular Culture.

Helen Zdriluk, who has contributed to the growth of the Drama in Education and Applied Theatre program for 12 years, is doing educational outreach for DART. She also teaches acting at Sheridan College.



GRAD PROFILE: Kari-Lynn Winters...

Kari-Lynn Winters graduated from Brock University in 1992 with an emphasis in Drama in Education and Production and Design. She then went on to graduate from the National Theatre School's Technical Production program, and worked for a number of theatre companies. Along with theatre, education has been an important part of Winters' life. She obtained a BEd from the University of Toronto, and taught elementary school in North Carolina and Oregon. In 2004, she graduated from the University of British Columbia with a master's degree in Multimodal Literacies, and won the Language and Literacy Researchers of Canada Award for her master's thesis — "Developing an Arts Integrated Reading Comprehension Program for Less Proficient Third and Fourth Grade Readers." She obtained a PhD in Language and Literacy Education from the University of British Columbia.

Winters co-founded Tickle Trunk Players with former DART student Lori Sherritt-Fleming (see tickletrunkplayers.com) and together they won an ING corporate sponsorship for playwriting and play production. She toured schools and libraries within the Greater Mainland, B.C. with the Tickle Trunk Players. In 2006, she won a SSHRC grant in order to research the arts and its relationship to authorship and literacy, and published her first picture book in 2007, Jeffrey and Sloth, which won a number of awards and took her on a provincial book tour. She also went on to write and publish a number of books, as well as write, produce, and perform a number of plays and won the Association of Educational Publishers' Distinguished Award for Fiction.


