Faculty Features

Faculty of Health Sciences



Lifespan Members, and Professors of Health Sciences, Terrance Wade and Deb O’Leary, along with their interdisciplinary team of collaborators, received 2018 CIHR Project Grant funding to conduct the Niagara Longitudinal Heart Study (NLHS). The goal of the NLHS is to examine the relationship between severe adversity in childhood (i.e., adverse childhood experiences, or ACEs) and adult cardiovascular disease (CVD) development. Based on earlier findings and other recent work, the research team

currently has a novel opportunity to build on baseline data from 3 previous research projects to prospectively test the effect of ACEs on cardiovascular development from childhood to early adulthood, and identify the psychosocial and physiological mediating and moderating pathways within this relationship. The importance of incorporating a multidimensional focus is clearly supported by recent ACEs research and reviews that show that previously identified traditional and behavioural risk factors for CVD, including family history, smoking, physical activity, alcohol use, and obesity, while important in their own right, do not explain away the relationship between ACEs and CVD.

**Brock Healthy
Youth Project**

The Brock Healthy Youth Project (BHYP) is a project being led by a transdisciplinary team of researchers from the Lifespan Centre and other Canadian and international universities. Key to the BHYP project is collaboration with over 30 partner organizations (e.g., WHO, UNICEF) and a youth engagement committee. The goal of BHYP is to examine the link between health-risk behaviours and adolescent brain development through a five-year longitudinal study that includes assessments of brain activity, genetics, endocrine status, physical activity, personality, and environmental factors. Participants include 1,500 youth (ages 8-13 at year one) who are completing 2 surveys annually over a five-year period. A subset of participants (N=500) is also completing a lab component which involves the collection of genetic, hormone, sleep, and brain activity measures over time. Goodman School of Business



Goodman School of Business faculty member, and Lifespan Member, Todd Green focuses his research on Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) - examining both the consumer response to CSR and the role of CSR in marketing communications. Dr. Green's most recent work looks at the influence of retailer size on consumer response to CSR initiatives by both large and small corporations. In a recent publication in the *Journal of Consumer Behavior*, Dr. Green's research shows that retailer size may moderate the positive effect that CSR initiatives have on consumer outcomes (e.g., increased purchase intentions, consumer perceptions of CSR, etc.). Specifically, Dr. Green's research has shown that consumers may respond more positively to small retailers' CSR activities, as compared to CSR from large retailers. Additionally, Dr. Green's work has demonstrated that clear consistency and commitment to CSR may serve as a means by which larger retailers can counter their size liability around consumer perceptions. In general, this research has clear implications for the retail management sector and furthers the general understanding of consumer perceptions/behaviour, all particularly important given the increasing focus on CSR and corporate outreach activities in the current economic climate.

Did You Know?

Here are some interest recent findings from some of our members...



Sandra Bosacki (*Educational Studies*)

Dr. Bosacki's research has found that Theory of Mind and Self-knowledge play important role in adolescents' perceived school engagement. Additionally, high levels of gratitude may relate to high levels of self-compassion, self-worth, and spirituality in adolescents. Finally, compared to adolescent males, adolescent females report higher levels of empathy, perceived behavioural control or moral self-worth, and lower levels of competence in their physical appearance.

Kathy Belicki (Psychology) - with Joshua Black

Drs. Belicki and Black's research found that dreaming of the deceased seems to be a very common experience after partner/spousal loss (86%), pet loss (75%), and prenatal loss (60%). Those who recalled dreams of the deceased endorsed more positive themed dreams of the deceased, which contrasts both with "ordinary" dreaming and with post-traumatic dreams. Additionally, their findings suggest that remembering a dream of the deceased is related most strongly to one's tendency to remember dreams in general.



Angela Evans (Psychology)

The Social-Cognitive Development lab has demonstrated that increasing Canadian and Chinese children's self-awareness, by having them look at themselves in a mirror, prior to asking them about cheating on a task increases their honesty. Additionally, having a sibling, in particular a younger sibling, was found to increase children's cheating and lie-telling behaviours.



Jan Frijters (Child and Youth Studies)

There is no single 'dyslexia' profile, though there are more or less common patterns. How does this relate to gene-brain-behaviour analysis? Because reading is a complex skill that has emerged relatively late in human evolution, our brains need to co-opt functionality that was never designed specifically for reading. As a result, when reading development fails it can fail in very different ways that may be linked differently to brain and gene function.



Kimberley Gammage (Kinesiology)

Recently Dr. Gammage's lab completed a study that examined the impact of BIAS (Body Image Awareness Seminars) on positive body image in men and women from the Brock-Niagara Centre for Health & Well-Being. This program was developed together with members of the centre and aimed to help people change their minds - not their bodies - to increase love and respect for their bodies and all the functions they perform, rather than

focusing on the appearance short-comings that many people perceive. The program - offered to a group of 24 older adults, individuals with cardiovascular disease, and those with multiple sclerosis or spinal cord injury - showed that after the 6-week program, participants had a great appreciation of their bodies.

Antonia Mantonakis (*Goodman School of Business*)

In previous work on serial position effects in choice (Mantonakis et al., 2009; *Psychological Science*), Dr. Mantonakis and colleagues demonstrated that primacy effects occur in shorter sequences, and recency effects occur in longer sequences, especially for higher knowledge choosers. In their most recent work (Quigley-McBride et al., 2018), they replicated this finding in a real-world context: a whiskey competition.



Frances Owen (*Child and Youth Studies*)

One of the projects in Dr. Owen's lab is a collaboration with Contact Niagara for Children's and Developmental Services examining the multi-sector collaborative process (est. 2014) to support youth (14 - 18 years of age) with a diagnosed or suspected developmental disability, and their families, develop a planned and coordinated transition from children's to adult developmental services. This builds on Dr. Owen's lab's work on human rights and work options for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This project includes a calculation of the Social Return on Investment of this planning process and its impacts.



Tony Volk (*Child and Youth Studies*)

Dr. Volk's research lab is closing in on the general personality trait that underlies "evil" behavior. Additionally, they have cross-cultural evidence for the adaptive, exploitative benefits of bullying. Finally, their research suggests that empathy might not matter very much for prosocial behavior. A fun bonus is that Dr. Volk's lab has a growing body of evidence showing that AC/DC, Zeppelin, and Floyd can interact with wine to create highly productive research!
