It's a comedy in two tragedies! Join us for a wild time travel adventure into two of Shakespeare's best known tragedies where anything can and does happen, including time warps, sword fighting, magic, cross-dressing and the appearance of ghostly wise fools.

Goodnight Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet) was first performed in Toronto in 1988, and went on to be performed nationally and internationally. It has become one of Ann-Marie MacDonald's most popular plays. Winner of the Governor General's Award for Drama, Goodnight Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet) is a feminist re-envisioning of Othello and Romeo and Juliet. Set in Queen's University in Kingston, overlooked and under-appreciated academic Constance Ledbelly has spent the last ten years ghost writing for a professor while trying to prove her theory that Othello and Romeo and Juliet were originally comedies written by an unknown author that Shakespeare plundered and made

into tragedies. When she deciphers the ancient 'Gustav Manuscript', Constance is propelled smack dab into the tragic turning points of each play, saving both Desdemona and Juliet from their tragic fates. The result is a topsy-turvy ride through the recesses of her own mind as Constance learns to appreciate her own self-worth, find confidence and discover who she really is.

Artistic Direction

"The dark night of the soul comes just before the revelation. When everything is lost, and all seems darkness, then comes the new life and all that is needed." -Joseph Campbell

Many of the themes of the play are entrenched in the philosophy of Carl Jung, who was a Swiss psychiatrist and founder of the school of analytical psychology. He is known for his theory of archetypes, the collective unconscious and his studies of the human psyche.

Constance's journey into the plays of Shakespeare is in fact an exploration of her own psyche. During the play, she reaches the ultimate low point in her life and is forced to look inside herself to find her own sense of strength and self-worth. The characters she meets during her journey are aspects of her personality which she needs to explore in order to find her sense of strength and identity. These aspects are both the good parts and what Jung calls the 'shadow' parts of herself who aren't serving her in a way that is useful.

The set of our play was inspired by Italian artist Giovanni Piranesi who was famous for his etchings of Rome and of fictitious and atmospheric 'prisons'. Our set designer Nigel Scott used these etchings to inspire the feel of the ivy league academic institution, classical architecture, combined with a distorted feel of the dream-like subconscious of Constance's mind.

The play was originally written for five actors to play all sixteen character roles among them with some of the females and males playing opposite gender roles. This is significant because the play also addresses questions of gender roles by commenting on the flexibility of gender identities and the importance of testing and changing their boundaries. Romeo and Juliet both dress in drag to attract Constance, and Desdemona wields a sword and engages in 'manly' sword play, thus blurring the lines of their gender roles. The play re-envisions the historical attitudes toward men and women and their roles in history and literature.

Curriculum Ties

This production of *Goodnight Desdemona* (*Good Morning Juliet*) is suitable for High School-Age audiences and provides an opportunity to enjoy the accessibility of Shakespeare in this comedic reimagining of two of his famous tragedies while combining both Shakespeare's language with modern and colloquial language. Curriculum connections include The Arts, Canadian and World Studies, Classical and International Languages, English, English As a Second Language and English Literacy Development, Social Sciences and Humanities. This production provides corresponding study in the following curricular subject areas: Gender studies, Women's studies, Medieval and Renaissance studies, Shakespeare studies and Drama studies.
