Plot Summary

Meet Marlene, who in 1980's London has just been promoted to managing director of the Top Girls Employment Agency. With a magic realist twist we see Marlene celebrate her success at a dinner party with five women from history, literature, and art, and as the drink begins to flow,

so do their stories of family, adventure, and loss which overlap in witty and humorous dialogue.

Throughout the play we also meet the real-life women in Marlene's life at the office. They struggle to rise to the top of the corporate ladder but are held back by lack of opportunity and the harsh competitiveness of the business world. We are also introduced to Joyce, who is Marlene's sister, and Joyce's daughter Angie who longs to escape the confines of her home life, and become a successful career-woman like her aunt Marlene.

The final scene of the play takes place a year earlier when Marlene visits Angie and Joyce in her small hometown in the English countryside. We learn that Angie has planned the visit without Joyce's knowledge. Joyce sees Marlene as someone who abandoned her family and thinks that they are better off without her. The final scene becomes a confrontation between the two sisters while they battle over their conflicting ideologies and secrets of their family's past are drawn out in a chilling conclusion.

About the playwright

Caryl Churchill is one of Britain's greatest living playwrights. Her witty, powerfully intelligent dialogue and her imaginative sense of dramatic structure saw her at the forefront of British playwriting in the 1980's and 1990's. *Top Girls* is perhaps her best-known work and was first performed in 1982 during Margaret Thatcher's Conservative government's reign in the UK.

Churchill's distinctive writing style is characterized by overlapping dialogue, and interruptions and is a feature of the play. Other notable works are *Serious Money, Mad Forest, The Skriker* and *Cloud Nine*. Churchill's plays have been performed on international stages, on the BBC radio and adapted for BBC television. They frequently deal with issues regarding women, abuses of power and sexual politics.

Her latest play, *Love and Information*, is being performed at The Canadian Stage Company in Toronto in April 2018.

Why Top Girls? Why now?

I have known this play for many years and first read the play while I was in high school. The University of British Columbia, where I attended, also did a production of it in the 1990's. Back then, going to the theatre to see stories about women was not the norm, it was the exception.

I remember being transfixed as a young woman, whose identity was still being formed, watching the stories of these bold, flawed and multi-layered characters unfold. Would I become a 'Top Girl'? What would that look like? Thirty-five years after *Top Girls* first premiered, what it means to be a 'top girl' still remains complex and not without obstacles.

For me, the question at the core of *Top Girls* is "what would you sacrifice to get to the top?" This question remains relevant because something is always sacrificed in the pursuit of success. This question has become even more relevant as news stories in recent months have broken about the abuse of power that top male

executives have wielded over many women in their pursuit of success, and the decision for many women and men to keep silent over the years for fear of ruining their careers. Here in Canada, the trial of former CBC host Jian Gomeshi also raised many questions about power and success. Marie Henein, Gomeshi's defence lawyer and a 'top girl' in her own right, was criticized for turning her back on the women's cause by defending him and ultimately winning his case.

Top Girls asks tough questions and looks at power and success in a critical light. When we think

of leadership, we may tend to think of aggressive negotiations, firm discipline, and a dominant physical presence. The question of women in power is a loaded one. The women in Marlene's world are not without their flaws and often turn to what may be considered more 'masculine' tactics by using their power in unsupportive ways over other women, thus inflating the role of the individual over the celebration of collective group gain. Angie, Marlene's teenage niece, is afraid to be left behind, a fear that today's young generation live with in this economy. Throughout the play, we also learn of the personal loneliness that Marlene endures in her pursuit of career success, and of her secret sacrifice that has underpinned her rise to the top.

As we continue in an era of what has been labeled Third-Wave of Feminism, women's stories have become front and centre as years of silenced stories have come bubbling to the surface, just like the historical women Marlene has dinner with in the first scene of the play. Churchill's *Top Girls* does not strive to provide solutions, or take sides in the debate, but only to shine a light on the tough complexities of what it means to 'rise to the top'.

Curriculum Ties

This production of *Top Girls* is suitable for high schoolage audiences and provides an opportunity to enjoy what is becoming a modern classic play from one of Britain's top living playwrights, if not the world. Caryl Churchill's plays remain relevant today as she tackles thought provoking issues and compelling debate within her multilayered characters.

Curriculum connection include Literature, World Studies, History, Gender Studies and Drama Studies.
