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

## SCIENCES AND FICTIONS: NEW HUMAN MODELS BEYOND BOUNDARIES

There has been an interest from a publisher in the book. We are looking for high quality papers that examine how sciences and fictions suggest 'new human models.' We are calling for chapters for the collection generally related to the following topics:

- ·Nano-, Bio-, Info-, and Cognitive (NBIC) sciences and new human models.
- ·Medical humanities and new human models
- ·Gender and new human models
- ·Pharmaceuticals and new human models
- ·Body works/modifications (fitness, piercing, tattooing, beauty culture, etc.), and new human models
- ·Contemporary British/American science/speculative fiction and new human models

This edited collection investigates what it means to be/come human in the techno-assisted and based world of the twenty-first century, looking at developments in sciences and how these are portrayed in contemporary (science and speculative) fictions. In Sciences and Fictions: Human Models Beyond Boundaries, sciences refer to nano-, bio-, info-, and cognitive (NBIC) sciences, and how they research and experiment with 'new human models,' fictions, on the other hand, refers to new human models that science fiction and speculative fiction imagine beyond boundaries, including sex, gender, race, ethnicity, colour, and ability.

THINKING WITH PLANTS AND FUNGI CONFERENCE, MAY 15-17, 2025

We are calling for papers from scholars and/or practitioners whose work speaks to one or more of the five interrelated conference themes. The questions below are intended to be illustrative but not exhaustive:



- 1. **Science and Research:** What are the promises, pitfalls, and possible future directions of research into plants and fungi? What remains unexplored? How does this work challenge scientific definitions and methods? How can scientists navigate the risks and opportunities of this research?
- 2. **Philosophy, History, and Theology:** How have philosophical and theological traditions, past and present, grappled with the unique lives of plants and fungi? What is at stake in extending mind, intelligence, or sentience to plants and fungi? How does the study of plants and fungi illuminate questions of metaphysics, ontology, epistemology, ethics, and aesthetics?
- 3. **Arts and Literature:** How do the arts express, embody, and invite others into relationship with plants and fungi? How does one responsibly represent or speak on behalf of the morethan-human world?
- 4. **Decolonial, Indigenous, and Folk Studies:** How do Indigenous, animist, and pagan traditions understand and interact with plants and fungi? Are the study and cultivation of plants and fungi tied to colonial projects and, if so, how? What are the enduring effects of these projects? How can scholars center decolonial approaches in scholarship and practice?
- 5. **Practice and Community:** how are communities and organizations enacting new practices of cooperation and care with plants and fungi? What new forms of technology, governance, design, storytelling, or pedagogy do vegetal and fungal life inspire? How might plants and fungi help address ongoing ecological crises in practice?

## **Contemporary Women Filmmakers and Posthumanism**

Editors Evdokia Stefanopoulou and Yannis Mazarakis invite book chapter proposals for a scholarly collection entitled Contemporary Women Filmmakers and Posthumanism. Edinburgh University Press has expressed interest in publishing the book.

## Proposal Deadline: December 1st, 2024

This collection seeks chapters that apply a critical posthumanist framework in the work of women filmmakers (from different cinematic traditions), examining both themes and style and situating the texts in the historical context of production. The guiding questions of this collection are as follows:

- How women filmmakers envision humanity's relation with the non-human world?
- What stylistic devices do they use to convey posthuman perspectives?
- How do women filmmakers situate such representations in the wider historical context of the films' production? (the Anthropocene, gender and race inequalities, etc.)? What are the political and ethical implications of such representations?
- How can we re-examine the much-discussed notion of female authorship in relation to critical posthumanism?

Our aim is to foreground the role that women filmmakers play in envisioning different forms of human subjectivity that move beyond anthropocentrism that can be expressed in different themes/approaches such as:

- ecology, ecofeminism, queer ecologies
- Non-human animals, animality
- Interspecies connections
- technological embodiment, relation with technology
- Hybridity, hybrid identities
- · critical race theories and postcolonialism
- Nomadic subjectivities, becoming-with, relationality
- Micro-scales, planetary scales
- The Anthhopocene, the Capitalocene, The Chthulucene

We welcome both individual and co-authored pieces for articles of 6000-7000 words.
