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

NEW BOOK:

This book addresses the most suggestive themes of transhumanism and critical posthumanism by placing them in dialogue with classic problems of metaphysics, and with some great thinkers of the past (Bruno, Spinoza, and above all Leibniz). The main purpose of this comparison is to invite transhumanists and critical posthumanists to consider a highly complex problematic tradition rooted in the history of philosophy. This study also makes use of examples drawn from the history of mythology, angelology, and mysticism.

At the same time, the book promotes dialogue between scholars of classical metaphysics and philosophy of religion, and the potential metaphysical/spiritual theories developed independently by transhumanist and posthumanist thinkers within an anti-dualist and naturalistic philosophical framework.

The goal is to 'enhance' contemporary transhumanism and posthumanism by promoting the need to safeguard intelligence as a principle, without falling into the trap of a violent and egotistic metaphysics.

About the Author:

Mattia Geretto received a PhD in Philosophy of Religion at the University of Perugia, Italy. Among his publications, L'angelologia leibniziana (2010) and many other articles on Leibniz. Since 2011 he is affiliated to Ca' Foscari University of Venice.

Environmental History challenging the Mediterranean (16th to 21st centuries)

Call for Proposals for the International Conference, organised at the University Côte d'Azur, 27-28th March 2025, by Léonie Boissière and Simon Dolet



In June 2025, France will host the Third United Nations Conference on the Oceans in Nice, with some 120 heads of state and government, but above all hundreds of specialists and institutional and non-institutional players. This time of debate and sharing on the future of the oceans is an opportunity for the discipline of history to take up these issues. The focus of this international conference is the Mediterranean, not just the sea but the Mediterranean world as a whole. Mediterranean studies have been intrinsically linked to the 'milieu' since the pioneering work of Fernand Braudel (Braudel, 1949). Today, environmental history no longer looks solely at the Braudelian milieu, but at all the interactions of human and non-human actors with the environment.

The aim of this conference is therefore to take a fresh look at the Mediterranean through the lens of environmental history. In other words, how does this field of history enable us to reconsider the spectrum of Mediterranean studies, from economic and maritime history to political history, via cultural and social history? To what extent does this area have its own specific dynamics? How do Mediterranean societies adapt to external models? How are practices specific to certain Mediterranean regions integrated into other areas, whether Mediterranean or not?

Submission: Proposals in French or English, the languages of this international conference, should be between 1 and 3,000 characters in length and accompanied by a bio-biographical presentation. They should be sent **before 30 September 2024** by email to leonie.boissiere@univ-cotedazur.fr and dolet.simon@gmail.com.



NEW (FREE) BOOK: Decoding Digital Culture with Science Fiction by Alan N. Shapiro



How do digital media technologies affect society and our lives? Through the cultural theory hypotheses of hyper-modernism, hyperreality, and posthumanism, Alan N. Shapiro investigates the social impact of Virtual/Augmented Reality, AI, social media platforms, robots, and the Brain-Computer Interface. His examination of concepts of Jean Baudrillard and Katherine Hayles, as well as films such as Blade Runner 2049, Ghost in the Shell, Ex Machina, and the TV series Black Mirror, suggests that the boundary between science fiction narratives and the »real world« has become indistinct. Science fictional thinking should be advanced as a principal mode of knowledge for grasping the world and digitalization.

More-Than-Human Rights: Interdisciplinary Perspectives for Earthly Flourishing Conference



MORE THAN HUMAN LIFE
NYU Law

The premise of this conference is that a fruitful discussion of the rights of nature – or, as we propose to call them, more-than-human (MOTH) rights – needs to consider a broad range of knowledges and practices.

In order to advance this dialogue, we recently published the book More-Than-Human Rights: An Ecology of Law, Thought and Narrative for Earthly Flourishing, edited by César Rodríguez-Garavito. This interdisciplinary conference will bring together scholars and practitioners from diverse fields and disciplinary backgrounds, including the social sciences, law, natural sciences, philosophy and the arts, to explore the concept of more-than-human rights from various angles.

Participants will engage in roundtable discussions of their papers, supplemented by keynote sessions led by experts in the field. Keynote speakers include: Christine Winter (University of Otago), David Gruber (CUNY; Project CETI); José Gualinga (Kawsak Sacha Initiative, Sarayaku Indigenous Peoples); Merlin Sheldrake (Vrije University Amsterdam), among others.

To participate in the conference, please submit an application using the provided link before **August 31st, 2024.** Your application should include a brief summary (250 words) of the original paper (up to 10,000 words) you intend to present at the conference. Papers may represent ongoing research or entirely new projects. Two months prior to the conference (mid-January 2025), all participants must submit their papers for review by fellow conference participants. After the conference, we will explore opportunities to publish the collection of essays that will come out of the Conference.
