Call for Papers for Special Issue "Colors in Econarratives about the Human and More-than-Human World" In this special issue, econarratives of colors explore the complexities of pairing material environments with their representations with narrative forms of environmental understanding and 'propose' a change in how we interact with the environment today. This endeavor could be effectively executed while exploring storytelling of coloring imaginaries and sustainable futures as 'narrative rehabilitation' to draw attention to values and responsibilities and envision strategies to avoid possible 'disastrous narrative endings'. Econarratives of colors could also be a new approach to overcoming the traditional dichotomies of how we see the world around us, including ourselves, laying the ground to think beyond colors in a more-than-human world. They might also encourage us to think beyond the classical narratological analysis, and consider new analytical tools suited to the current planetary challenges.

The working language is English. Please send an abstract of up to 300 words and further queries to Professor Karpouzou's email at pkarpouzou@phil.uoa.gr and Dr. Zampaki's e-mail at nikzamp@phil.uoa.gr until the 31st of August 2024. After the abstracts' final selection and approval/acceptance, the Editors will notify the author(s) to submit their full in articles (6.000-8.000 words) to their e-mails by the end of February 2025.

The hypervisibility of posthuman narratives and imagery in recent years demonstrates filmmakers' and viewers' attractions to "the pressing question of what it means to be human under the conditions of globalisation, technoscience, late capitalism and climate change." Moreover, narratives that feature humanity in crisis, most notably in dystopian science fiction, horror and related genre hybrids, are particularly aligned with critical posthumanism in that they draw attention to major flaws in human status quos to argue that only drastic change could possibly alter the existing (and dire) state of affairs. Indigenous women filmmakers are at the forefront of efforts to tailor cinematic genre conventions to the "pressing" concerns critical posthumanism targets. This talk specifically highlights the generic innovations of Danis Goulet (Cree-Métis), Lisa Jackson (Anishinaabe), and Elle-Máijá Tailfeathers (Blackfoot/Sámi) to propose their relevance to posthuman theory.

Missy Molloy is Senior Lecturer in film at Te Herenga Waka-Victoria University of Wellington in Aotearoa New Zealand, where she lectures on women's, queer, posthuman and activist cinemas. She is co-author of Screening the Posthuman (Oxford University Press 2023) and co-editor of ReFocus: The Films of Susanne Bier (Edinburgh University Press 2018). Her publications include "Indigenous Futurist and Women-Centred Dystopian Film" (Feminist Posthumanism and Postfeminist Humanism, Bloomsbury 2023), the video essay "Art Cinema's Suicidal Posthuman Women" ([in]Transition: Journal of Videographic Film & Moving Image Studies, forthcoming 2024), and "Indigenous Feminism Revitalizing the Long Take: *Waru and The Body Remembers When the World Broke Open*" (Jump Cut 2021).

4-year postdoc position (100%) in feminist philosophy of climate science, Universität Bern, Switzerland

The Institute of Philosophy in Bern invites applications for a 4-year fully funded postdoc position in feminist philosophy of climate science, starting 1 September 2024 (or as soon as possible thereafter).

The position is funded by the Swiss National Science Foundation through Prof. Julie Jebeile's SNF PRIMA Grant project "Climate Change Adaptation through the Feminist Kaleidoscope - Toward a Feminist Philosophy of Climate Science". The salary is competitive. Travel and further research funding

The selected candidate will also be affiliated with the Oeschger Centre for Climate Change Research which constitutes a great opportunity for fruitful interdisciplinary collaborations.

Requirements:

- To hold a PhD in philosophy; the PhD must be in hand from the start of the position
- To have a background in feminist epistemology
- Ideally, to have skills in one or more of these domains: philosophy of climate science, epistemology of Indigenous and local knowledge, climate ethics, environmental philosophy, climate science
- To have excellent skills in English
- Applications from underrepresented groups in academic philosophy are of course strongly encouraged.

Applications should be submitted to julie.jebeile@unibe.ch and contain (1) a motivation letter detailing the research interests and experience, (2) a CV, (3) a one-page research statement (excluding references) describing the research to be pursued within the project, (4) a writing sample such as a paper or a book chapter. Two reference letters are expected and should be directly sent by the referees. Review of the applications will start on **15 April 2024** and will continue until the position is filled. Interviews will take place online.
