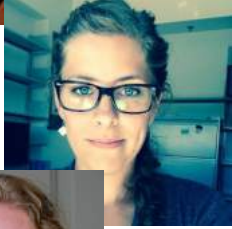

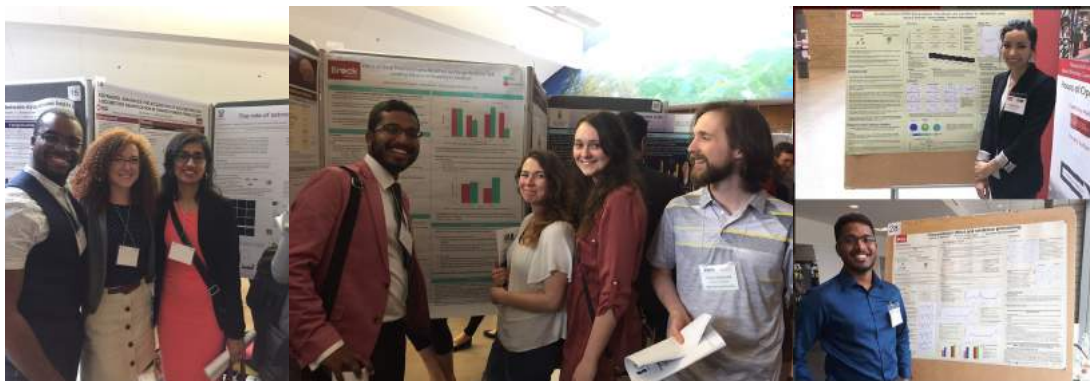
## Annual Ontario Psychology Undergraduate Thesis Conference

## Faculty and Staff Grants and Awards

- ◆ **Dr. Tim Murphy** has been awarded the Distinguished Teaching Award this year. - ◆ **Drs. Teena Willoughby, Angela Evans, & Caitlin Mahy** along with Co-Applicant Rob Coplan from Carleton University received a SSHRC Connection Grant for hosting Development 2018 at Brock University (\$24,703).
- ◆ **Dr. Caitlin Mahy** received an Ontario Early Research Award (2018-2023) titled “The development of young children’s future-oriented memory.” The Early Researcher Awards program gives funding to new researchers working at publicly funded Ontario research institutions to build a research team (i.e., to support a postdoc or graduate students). The award is valued at \$150,000. Additionally, Dr. Mahy received the Faculty of Social Sciences Untenured Researcher of the Year Award!
- ◆ **Dr. Teena Willoughby** is an Active Member of the Networks of Centres of Excellence of Canada-International Knowledge Translation Platforms (NCE-ICKYP) grant for the Heathy Young People Everywhere Project (\$1,600,000). Dr. Willoughby also received a Brock University Retention Grant (\$6,740).
- ◆ **Dr. Angela Evans** received a CRISS grant for her work examining “Children’s understanding of Asking versus Telling” (\$2,900) as well as an Arizona State University Project Expansion Grant (Category 3) with her co-applicant Dr. Stacia Stolzenberg (\$15,000 USD).
- ◆ **Dr. Angela Book** received a SSHRC Insight grant for her work examining personality traits of psychopaths’ victims.
- ◆ **Jayne Morrish (MA 2012)** received one of the 2017 Brock University President’s Distinguished Staff Service Awards for Outstanding Contributions.

Dr. Jenkins was the 2018 recipient of the Pickering Award for Outstanding Contribution to Developmental Psychology for her work on emotion development and developmental psychopathology. Over 30 symposia and 200 posters were presented during the conference and attendees were able to experience some of the best of Niagara's food at an evening food truck event held on campus. 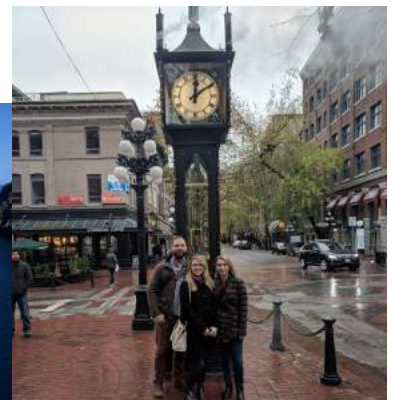

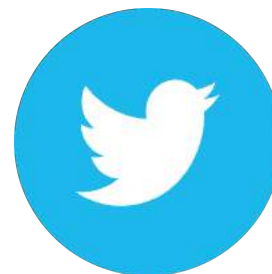

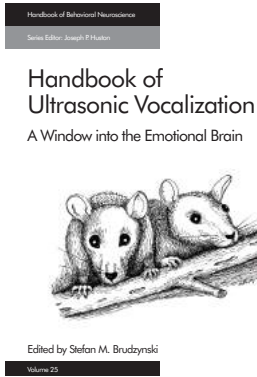
