Students and faculty alike were encouraged to spend time learning and reflecting on the legacy of colonization in Canada, the history of residential schools, the ongoing impacts of intergenerational trauma and the resilience and beauty of Indigenous cultures.

Several Brock faculty and staff participated by donning orange shirts or incorporating assignments or discussions into their teaching this week to encourage reflection on this important day. For example, students in PSYC 3P62 "Intro to Qualitative Methods in Psychology" (Scott Neufeld) critically analyzed a qualitative research paper on (former) Senator Lynn Beyak's residential school denialism. Students in PSYC 3P65 "Brain and Language" (Veena Dwivedi) discussed colonization and Indigenous language loss.



 Professor Cheryl McCormick received an NSERC RTI grant (Assistant Professor Paula Duarte-Guterman was a Co-PI) to fund the purchase of new molecular equipment for their research labs. Professor McCormick also received an NSERC Discovery Grant to study "Adolescence: A Sensitive Period for Shaping the Adult Social Brain"

- In honour of her status as one of Brock's newest Canada Research Chair's Dr. Duarte-Guterman has also been featured on one of several banners celebrating Brock's CRCs around campus. Dr. Duarte-Guterman also received an NSERC Discovery Grant to expand her research on "Modulation of neuroplasticity and behaviour through parental experience". - Congratulations to Dr. Karen Campbell was honoured to receive the "outstanding co-op supervisor of the term" award after being nominated by her co-op/honours student Kiran Randhawa.
- The Campbell lab has been awarded a \$340K Project Grant from CIHR to look at the cognitive and neural mechanisms underlying age-related declines in associative memory and to develop a novel technique to improve older adults' memory for events in everyday life. The goal of this research is to broaden our understanding of the cognitive and neural mechanisms underlying age-related declines in associative memory and to develop a simple technique that older adults can use in everyday life to improve their event-related memory.
- In May 2022, Dr. Veena Dwivedi was very honoured to give an invited lecture for the Faculty of Linguistics, Philology and Phonetics "General Linguistics Seminar, Trinity Term 2022" at Oxford University on the subject of "Affect and linguistic anomaly in sentence: An ERP investigation".
- Professor Cathy Mondloch was awarded an NSERC Discovery Grant (\$275,000 over 5 years) for her project titled Learning to Recognize Faces Despite Within Person Variability in Appearance: A Developmental Approach. These federal funds will allow Cathy and her students to deepen their understanding of the mechanisms underlying face learning in children, and in young and older adults.









annual APA conference to present their work on "Shifting the Social Boundaries of "Criminal": (De)Criminalization as a (De)Stigmatizing Process".



Celebrating Grad Student Success!

Shealin Murray (pictured here presenting her MA research at Brock's Faculty of Math and Science graduate conference) successfully defended her MA thesis titled "Characterizing the Development of Reward Evaluation Across Adolescence in Female and Male Long-Evans Rats". Little is known about how reward evaluation may change throughout adolescence, and how



these developmental trajectories may vary between reward types and between sexes. Shealin's thesis work focused on characterizing changes in sensitivity to and motivation for reward across adolescence in female and male Long-Evans rats. Overall, her thesis work suggests that the development of reward processing is dynamic across the adolescent period, and that peaks in reward evaluation depend on sex and procedure. Shealin ALSO received OGS funding for the first year of her PhD at Brock where she will continue working with Dr. Cheryl McCormick. Congratulations Shealin!



Special congratulations go out to our 18 Brock Honours Students who presented, many of them for their first time ever presenting at a conference:



He co-presented with long-time community collaborator and Downtown Eastside resident/advocate Nicolas Leech-Crier.

Scott also helped to co-research, co-produce and "starred in" a mini documentary about his (and many others'...) long-standing work on community research ethics in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside. "Don't read us the book we wrote": Telling the story of the Downtown Eastside Community Research Ethics Workshop" (Quotidian Productions) is a short (17:41) mini-documentary that was officially launched at a community-engaged research conference in Vancouver in May 2022. Scott also served as an advisory consultant for another short film released in July 2022 titled "Building Hope: Substance use in the trades". Influenced by Scott's ongoing research on substance use-focused anti-stigma campaigns in Canada, this short video was co-produced by Tides of Change White Rock/South Surrey (BC) Community Action Team, Base Two Media and Health Canada and is designed to reach a target audience of men working in the trades who may be at risk of death from illicit drug toxicity (overdose).
