How do we realize Indigenous self-determination
in settler-led research?

Where does digital data fit into this?

Key Issues

- Research as a colonial enterprise:
 - *Indigenous peoples are “known,” not ‘knowers’*
 - *Data, findings, results: all written from settler perspectives*
- Data used and held by settlers/settler institutions

Indigenous Data Sovereignty

“...the right of Indigenous Peoples to own, control, access and possess data that derive from them, and which pertain to their members, knowledge systems, customs or territories.”

(Kukutai et al., 2020: 654)

OCAP



- Ownership
- Control
- Access
- Possession

Implementing in Research

2 Ongoing projects:

- Building Inter-National Sovereignty: The Case of the Big Salmon River
 - *2 nations; 13 First Nations; 3 organizations*
- Indigenous Housing in Niagara
 - *2 peoples; 5 organizations; urban Indigenous population*

Implementing in Research – Institutional Barriers

- Ethics considerations: data ownership + retention
- Open data policies
 - *SSHRC*
 - *Academic journals*
- Lack of institutional know-how
 - *No existing policies/frameworks*
 - *Lack of preparation for Indigenous ownership*
 - *Assumption: university as authority*

Implementing in Research – Solutions

- Centre Indigenous sovereignty: partners hold data
 - *Access granted through data sharing agreements*
- Grant proposals: write in Indigenous data sovereignty
 - *Costs for IT infrastructure to host*
 - *Explicit reference to implementation of OCAP + concrete plan*
- Ethics: go through Indigenous processes first
- Agreements with partners as part of project development discussions
